### Nostalgia



### Nostalgia



### Jim Toth




#### **Professors**

It was cut open late in the day, and the items inside exploded outward in relief from being bound for who knows how long. Wis's wardrobe, potential art media and wardrobe pieces for anyone present were theirs for the taking. Marceil was strong, progressive and caring. How she could design and fabricate huge metal sculptures that found their way into downtown Milwaukee was over-the-top incredible. She was the heartbeat of Carroll's Art Department and helped numerous students fledge in ways that were uniquely theirs.
