## **Carroll University Compact**

Carroll University is a community for learning. As individuals, we come to the campus from different homes and cultures. We bring with us our distinctive perspectives, traditions and experiences. Here, we become participants in a community dedicated to the pursuit of academic excellence, personal fulfillment and spiritual meaning. Choosing to join such a community obligates each member to consider thoughtfully the values espoused by the larger group. We therefore invite you to contemplate these ideals and strive toward their realization. We ask that you enter into a voluntary compact with the other members of the community that is Carroll University to live and work according to these values.

### **I will value the human diversity and dignity of all people and will respect their ideas, opinions and traditions.**

This ideal requires openness of mind, a willingness to affirm the differences that exist among us, and a desire to develop shared understanding. Dedication to this ideal is inconsistent with behaviors that compromise or demean individuals and groups.

### **I will practice personal and academic integrity.**

This ideal requires a commitment to honesty, a regard for the rights and feelings of others, and the courage to speak one's convictions. It obligates each member of the community to support the creation of a positive learning and living environment and is inconsistent with cheating in courses, games or sports; lying, excuse-making or plagiarizing; and infidelity, coercion or disloyalty in personal relationships.

### **I will care for the physical environment of the campus and its neighborhood setting.**

This ideal requires stewardship of the resources allocated to us, and a commitment to upholding the natural ecology of the campus and the larger community of Waukesha. Devotion to this ideal is inconsistent with all forms of theft, vandalism and misappropriation; wastefulness or destruction; and violation of the rights of others to live, learn and work in a clean and healthy environment.

### **I will support and enhance the development of others.**

This ideal requires a commitment to creation of an empowering learning and working environment, where collaboration, trust and cooperation are favored over suspicion and excessive competition. Dedication to this ideal is inconsistent with blaming or inhibiting the growth of others.

### **I will encourage creativity, artistic expression and excellence in all areas of our lives.**

This ideal requires the understanding that beauty and boldness are inherent to the human spirit. A commitment to this ideal is inconsistent with devaluing the work, performance or expressions of another person.

### **I will seek to understand my purpose in the world.**

This ideal requires the development of a global vision, an understanding that one is a citizen of the international community. Dedication to this ideal is inconsistent with parochialism, bigotry and selfish use or allocation of shared resources.

### **I will dedicate myself to exploration of personal values and the spiritual quest for meaning.**

This ideal requires the willingness to explore one's inner life through reflection, study and inquiry.

Full time undergraduate students with other comparable coverage may request a waiver from the Carroll University sponsored plan. Any student who does not complete the waiver process by August 31, 2011 will be automatically enrolled in the Carroll University Student Health Insurance Plan and the cost of the plan will be billed to the student's account. (Please note: many insurance and/or HMO plans do not provide coverage outside of a particular area, and therefore you should review your policy before waiving the plan offered by the University.) Students are solely responsible for the cost of their medical care.

# A READING LIST FOR PARENTS

***Don't Tell Me What to Do, Just Send Money: The Essential Parenting Guide to the College Years***  
Helen E. Johnson, Christine Schelhas-Miller. 2003

Parenting a college-bound student is a tricky business - - combining your emotional and financial support with your child's newfound independence can seem nearly impossible. Topics are addressed frankly, and many parents may have trouble reading the sections on controversial subjects such as drug and alcohol use, birth control, homosexuality, and changes in religious and political beliefs. The emphasis here is not changing your kid's mind about any of these things, but rather how parents can approach these sensitive topics while maintaining a positive and honest relationship. Most pages contain small text boxes highlighting what's on your mind and what's on your child's mind, as well as practical lists suggesting what to do and what to avoid, and these can be extremely helpful as a quick reference when faced with a sudden announcement from your student who's decided to change majors, stop living in the dorm, or study abroad. With a down-to-earth tone and clear insight into the minds of both parents and college students, this is an easy-to-read book that manages to handle difficult topics without preaching or downplaying important events.

***Empty Nest...Full Heart: The Journey from Home to College***  
Andrea Van Steenhouse. 2002

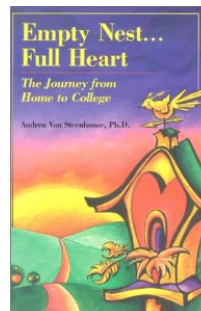
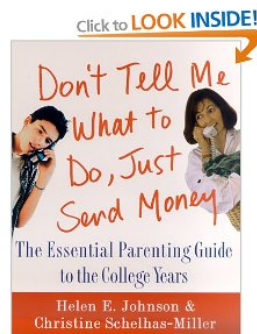
Van Steenhouse offers a lighthearted, yet savvy, look at this turbulent time through her generous and compassionate world view, making it lively, humorous, and emotionally resonant. She has interviewed hundreds of families making this difficult passage and includes their stories, while providing her trademark sensibility for handling each stage of the emancipation journey - - the senior year in high school, moving through the summer after graduation, the final departure for college, and the freshman year.

***The Launching Years: Strategies for Parenting from Senior to College Life***  
Laura Kastner, Jennifer Fugett Wyatt. 2002

The Launching Years - - a must-read for parents coping with the two-year transition from high school to college - - is an insightful and lively tour of the bumpy road involving college applications, senioritis, freshman freedom, and parent/child separation anxiety. "Launching a child into college can feel as if it's one of our last hands-on parenting acts," explain authors Laura Kastner and Jennifer Wyatt. The beauty of this book's approach is two-fold. First it opens a window onto the world of young people leaving home, exploring application procrastination, senioritis, college choice, ambivalence about independence, and freshman freak-out. At the same time, it holds up a mirror to parents, to help them discover deeper truths about themselves with - - and without - - their children. For example, one section about college applications advises parents to consider the college decision as one involving their child's identity rather than their own and to make sure the college is a good match for the child.

***Let the Journey Begin: A Parent's Monthly Guide to the College Experience***  
Jacqueline Mackay, Wanda Ingram. 2001

The brief text includes innovative features and activities to help parents deal with the issues they and their first-year children face during the freshman year of college. *Let the Journey Begin* highlights the ongoing process of adjustment and is structured in eight sections to reflect the school year cycle. Features of text include student and parent reflection, guided journal entries, checklists, problems and solutions, and explanations of college terms.



***Letting Go: A Parent's Guide to Understanding the College Years, Fifth Edition***

Karen Levin Coburn, Madge Lawrence Treeger. 2009

This bestselling guide, read by hundreds of thousands of parents over the past decade, is now better than ever, newly revised and completely updated. Based on real-life experience and recommended by colleges and universities around the country, *Letting Go* offers compassionate, practical, and up-to-the-minute information to help parents with the emotional and social changes of the college years.

***The Naked Roommate: And 107 Other Issues You Might Run Into in College***

Harlan Cohen. 2005

Students work hard to get into college, but once on campus, few know what to expect. According to the latest research, over a third of first-year college students report getting homesick; more than 40% report being too afraid to approach their professors; and just over 60% report experiencing some sort of depression (the percentage increases by junior year). Combine these with the reality that about one in four students do not return to the same campus their sophomore year and it's clear – the first year isn't easy.

Cohen asked more than 1,000 students from more than 100 college campuses the question, "If you could go back in time and give freshmen you a tip, what would you tell you, and why?" The results are more than 400 pages of stories, advice, facts, stats, and invaluable information. The Naked Roommate also includes questions and answers as published in his nationally syndicated Help Me, Harlan! advice column.

***When Your Kid Goes to College: A Parent's Survival Guide***

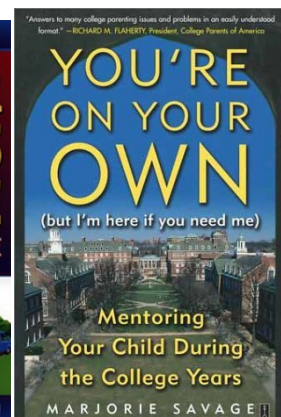
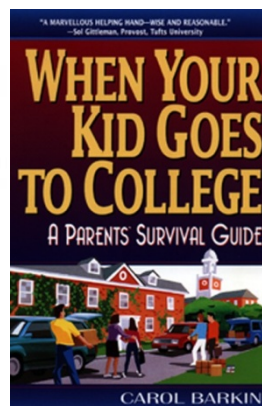
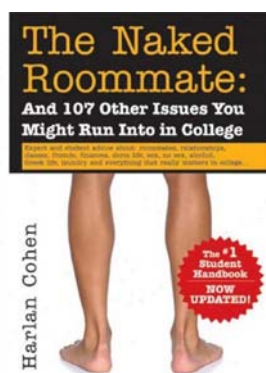
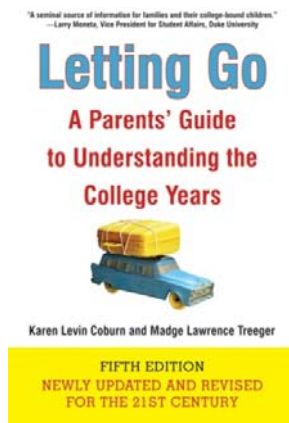

You've taught them how to do their laundry, brought them a year's supply of toothpaste and shampoo, and lectured them on the do's and don'ts of life beyond your home. The time has come for your child to leave for college, but are you prepared to say goodbye? Written by a mother who survived the perils of packing her own child off to school, *When Your Kid Goes to College* provides supportive, reassuring, and helpful tips for handling this inevitable but difficult separation. Saying goodbye isn't the end of the world; it's the beginning of an exciting new one for your child and you!

***You're On Your Own (But I'm Here if you Need Me): Mentoring Your Child During the College Years***

Majorie Savage. 2003

Savage, who has worked with parents and students at the University of Minnesota for a decade (she's now the director of its parent-liaison program), addresses the sometimes tough issues facing parents and their college-age kids, as the latter seek independence (but still rely on counsel from Mom and Dad) and the former try to figure out just how involved they should be in junior's undergraduate experience. In 12 chapters that span the summer before college, the culture shock of school (and the corresponding empty-nest shake-up for parents), the freshman 15, course loads, extracurricular activities, risky or defiant behaviors and life beyond the BA. Savage gives parents clear and seasoned advice-and offers tips for students as well. Illustrating her points through anecdotes, charts and bullet-pointed lists, she crafts a readable, if sometimes very commonsensical, guide to establishing the right level of parental involvement. For nervous parents, this should be a reassuring and helpful book.



# FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. How do I know how my student is doing academically?

Open communication between you and your student regarding his or her academic details and performance is important to each of your experiences, so have a strategy. Prior to your student's arrival on campus, sit down and discuss how you will share this information and how that sharing will be accomplished. It is important to note that your student's academic information is confidential in nature to protect his or her privacy, so review the FERPA details available to you on the Registrar's website <http://www.carrollu.edu/academics/registrar/>. Your student has the ability to file a FERPA waiver with the Registrar that would allow specific individuals to have access to his or her academic records, if they choose to do so. Open communication about your concerns as a parent or guardian, and discussion about how you will share this information, will allow all of you to agree on a strategy and take collective ownership of this decision.
2. Whom do I talk to if I am concerned about how my student is doing?

You can contact the Director of Student Success, Jeffrey McNamara. His contact information is [jmcnamar@carrollu.edu](mailto:jmcnamar@carrollu.edu) or (262) 524-7360. He will assist you or put you in touch with the appropriate person.
3. How does advising work at Carroll?

If your student has declared a major, he or she will be assigned a faculty advisor within that academic area. Typically, your student's academic advisor will also teach courses in the academic discipline in which your student is majoring. Your student is *required* to meet with his or her academic advisor once per semester prior to course registration for the upcoming academic semester. If your student is an undecided student, in other words, a student deciding what his/her academic choice of study will be, he/she will also be assigned a faculty or professional staff advisor. This individual will assist your student in navigating the decision-making process and exploring his/her interest areas in focused and purposeful ways. Your student has important academic advising responsibilities at Carroll. He or she is expected to be an active, engaged partner in the advising process. A more extended description of academic advising at Carroll is available to your student via the Student Handbook. You may also find this information helpful in supporting academic advising-related discussions with your student.
4. When do students sign up for classes for fall term?

Students will register for the fall term in the spring. Registration and advising will begin in late February and run into March.
5. How do students know what language course they should begin with at Carroll University?

Students currently complete an online language placement exam during their New Freshman Registration program on campus. Students who do not come to campus, but participate in the Online Registration program, will typically be sent a link to the language placement exam by their phone registration scheduler. Results of this exam will provide a recommendation for an appropriate initial course the student should take at Carroll. If a student has a special circumstance regarding a language, he/she will be referred to a faculty member who will assist in decision-making regarding what course might best fit his/her individual situation.
6. Does credit that my student has taken at another college or university count at Carroll?

In order for credit to be accepted at Carroll, the student needs to fill out a Transfer Credit Approval form. This is found at the Registrar's Office and is turned into the Registrar's Office. Once the course is reviewed, the student will be told if the course will transfer into Carroll and what Carroll course is its equivalent.
7. Are there additional financing options available after the Stafford Loans?

There are two different forms of financing options available to families. The additional loan options available are Parent PLUS loans and Alternative/Private loans. Families can review the different options at: [http://www.carrollu.edu/prospective/finaid\\_loans.asp](http://www.carrollu.edu/prospective/finaid_loans.asp). The other additional option for financing involves a monthly payment plan through the business office.

8. Does a student have to apply for financial aid every year?  
Yes. A student does have to file the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) each year he/she will be in school to be eligible for need-based aid. A student can complete the FAFSA at [www.FAFSA.gov](http://www.FAFSA.gov).
9. Will my student's financial aid award change every year?  
The financial aid that your student receives from Carroll University typically will not change from year to year unless his/her housing status changes. Federal and state aid that your student may receive could potentially change, based on the results of the FAFSA from year to year.
10. How do I know where my student will be working (if he/she was awarded campus employment) and when will he/she get paid?  
If your student was awarded campus employment, he/she must complete his/her job application (this application will be included with his/her final financial aid award). The Director of Campus Employment will then assign your student a job based on one of his/her top four choices listed on his/her application. If we cannot find your student a position among those choices, we will contact your student to tell him/her what is available. We will then notify your student of his/her campus employment position by the end of the second week in August. This notification will be via your student's Carroll portal account.  
  
Your student will get paid on the 10<sup>th</sup> of every month for the prior month's hours. Your student can elect to have funds deposited via direct deposit if he/she would like. Otherwise, your student can pick up his/her paycheck in the Business Office.
11. Why don't work study/campus employment earnings apply to a student's charges?  
We are required to give the student a paycheck for any money he/she has earned because not all students chose to work and not all students earn the full award they have been given. Students can then use this money to pay for future payments or for personal spending.
12. Can my student's tuition be paid for with a credit card?  
Yes, we accept Master Card, VISA, and American Express. Students or parents may make credit card payments in person at the business office. Students may make credit card payments online at [my.carrollu.edu](http://my.carrollu.edu). In order for parents or authorized users to make an online payment, they first must have their student create a username and password for them. Parents or authorized users can then go to [my.carrollu.edu](http://my.carrollu.edu) and click on parent/authorized users under ePAY. For security reasons, credit card payments are no longer accepted over the phone.
13. Can students charge books from the bookstore to their student account?  
Currently enrolled students who have a PiONEer card, have no holds on their student account, and have completed the Financial Responsibility Agreement may charge up to \$750 per semester at the Carroll University bookstore. The BookCHARGE is available 10 days prior to the start of the semester and ends one week after the semester begins.
14. Can students change their meal plans?  
Students may increase their meal plan at any time. Meal plan increases must remain within weekly or block selection (i.e. 10 Meal Weekly Reservation can be upgraded to 14 Meal Weekly Reservation but not to 160 Meal Block Reservation). The deadline to decrease or cancel a meal plan is the last day to add classes each semester as published in the university catalog and academic calendar.
15. What about vehicles on campus?  
Resident students, except for freshmen, may have vehicles on campus and are assigned parking via a lottery at the start of the school year. Fees are charged for a resident having a vehicle on campus. Commuter students are issued permits, but there is not a charge.
16. What if students get locked out of their rooms?  
Students should contact a resident assistant in their building or, if no one is available, they can contact Public Safety at 262-524-7300 to let them in. Their first lock-out is free and beginning with the second lock-out, students will be assessed a \$5.00 charge on their student account.

17. What if a campus emergency occurs?

The Carroll University Department of Public Safety seeks to provide service, safety, and protection of persons and property within our community; to educate the community about security issues, personal safety measures and protective strategies; to provide a visible, reassuring and accessible presence; and to provide a level of service that fosters positive community relations. Certainly, no one can predict emergencies, but the University does have a Guideline for University Emergencies protocol to assist with the efforts. In addition to Public Safety Staff, the department maintains a strong working relationship with the Waukesha Police Department, as well as county, state and federal law enforcement agencies. The Waukesha Police and Fire departments are located close to campus. These agencies respond promptly when the University requests their assistance.

18. How does my student hook up a computer on campus?

Wired connections are available in the residence hall rooms. The ITS Department provides a 25-foot network cable to first-year students when they check into their rooms. Wireless network access (Wi-Fi) is available just about everywhere else on campus. Instructions are provided for connecting to the network and ITS will assist with any problems getting connected.

19. How can I get mail and packages to my student?

Each resident is assigned a mailbox in his/her residence hall. The mailboxes are located near the front desk in each hall. A student mail clerk distributes mail Monday through Friday. Your student's campus mail address:
